

Example: Minimum wage


Federal	Sets national minimum wage	\$7.25 (per hour)
State	Sets statewide minimum wage.	\$16.00 (California)
County	Sets minimum living wage for county contractors and subcontractors for municipal services.	\$18.00 (Marin)
City/Town	Sets local minimum wage for jurisdiction only . E.g. Town of Novato only has authority to set minimum wage within Novato's borders	\$16.04-\$16.86 (Novato)





The responsibility for maintenance/paving of Sir Francis Drake Blvd changes for each jurisdiction you drive through.




<u>Three</u> County Supervisorial Districts overlap with City of San Rafael Jurisdiction

Gerstle Park, Bret Harte = **District 2** (Supervisor Katie Rice)








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Typical County funding

California County Revenues










Net County Cost by Service Area

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Types of taxes that fund Local Government

Property tax

Basic property taxes: ("Regressive" tax) A % based on the assessed property value (Per Prop 13: **frozen in time from the year property was purchased**, only increases max. 2% per year and up to a max. amount based on the total value)

Parcel taxes: ("Flat" tax) One \$ amount applied the same to all properties

Sales tax:

8.25% in Marin. Applied to every purchase ("use" tax)


8.50% in Novato

9.00% in Corte Madera & Fairfax

9.25% in Larkspur, San Anselmo, San Rafael, & Sausalito




Where does \$1.00 of property tax go?








Where does \$1.00 of sales tax go?





Marin County Executive's Office - Organizational Chart by Department







Affordable Housing:

- Emergency Rental Assistance
- Tenant Protections
- Preservation of Existing Affordable House Stock
- Development of New Affordable and Workforce Housing
- 2015-2022:
 - Committed \$49M+ toward affordable house initiatives
 - o Added 1400+ affordable housing units
- June 2023 Marin County's Housing Element accepted by State
 - o Plan to add 3500+ new affordable housing units in unincorporated areas
- Rehabilitation of Golden Gate Village in collaboration with MHA
- Oak Hill Housing Development





Homelessness:

- BOS approved "Housing First" policy in 2017
- 2017-2022:
 - 1900+ people connected to housing
 - o 2300+ unique clients served by shelter system
 - 800 chronically homeless, 100+ veterans and 205 families placed in permanent housing
- 2 new Project Homekey facilities 90 housing units

- \$2.5M Participatory Budgeting
 - o 3600 community members voted
 - o 24 projects funded

 - Allocating resources to communities with the greatest need to advance equitable outcomes
 - Ensuring programs, projects, plans and investments reduce disparities by County's most marginalized community members
